LOOKING AT LIFE

It seems to me that you will have to do a little bit more than say "boo" to scare the American public.

You are of course all aware of the violent controversy that has been raging about tobacco and lung cancer. According to some of the findings, cigarettes are more than coffin nails, and anybody who smokes a pack or two a day is doomed to an early death.

I know one man who is 83 years old. He has been smoking cigarettes all his life and is apparently hale and hearty.

But now he is scared. He is gradually tapering off. Whereas he used to smoke 40 a day he is now down to 36.

"I don't want to die from lung cancer," he told me. "So I am doing it bit by bit. By the time I am 90 I should have got rid of the cigarette habit altogether."

I don't like to talk about myself. But I know a few other people who know better than himself. Whom can anybody cite as either a horrible or a pleasant example better than himself?

I used to be an inveterate smoker. Thirty to 40 pipes a day. Plus a pack or a pack and a half of cigarettes to get the pipe taste out of my mouth. I couldn't write a line without a pipe or a cigarette in my mouth.

Then one day my ticker went bad on me. The doctor sent me to the hospital. The first thing he did was to order my weight down from 180 to 140 pounds. No more nibbling. No more snacks between meals or icebox foraging late at night. No pies no cakes, a little starch as possible.

At first it was terrible. When I came out of the hospital I purposely shunned the pantry where the refrigerator stood. I couldn't bear to look at it with all its lovely and fattening contents.

Now, after a few months, I have lost my appetite for all those wonderful things that I thought I couldn't get along without.

I am still down to 140 pounds. Just to show you I intend to stay that way, I had all my trousers taken in by the tailor and bought two new belts. The old ones were too big for my shrunken figure.

The doctor also told me to stop smoking for a while. I yelled my head off. Anything but that! Without a pipe I could never, never write another line. I'd starve to death.

But I did stop smoking. Not by bit, mind you. The doctor said that wasn't the way. Stop and stop all at once he said.

So I did it. It is more than four months now since I have had my last smoke. A couple of weeks ago, my medic told me I could smoke again—within reason.

I tried it. I couldn't finish half of it. It tasted terrible. Then I tried a cigarette. The same thing. After three or four puffs I threw the thing away.

Mind you I don't know whether cigarettes are good or bad for you. Personally, I don't really believe that unless you are susceptible to cancer you'll get it from cigarettes.

But I do know this. If you HAVE to do a thing which might or might not be good for you—then why do it?

Incidentally I just looked at the earnings statements of the three largest cigarette manufacturers in the country. They have all gone up.

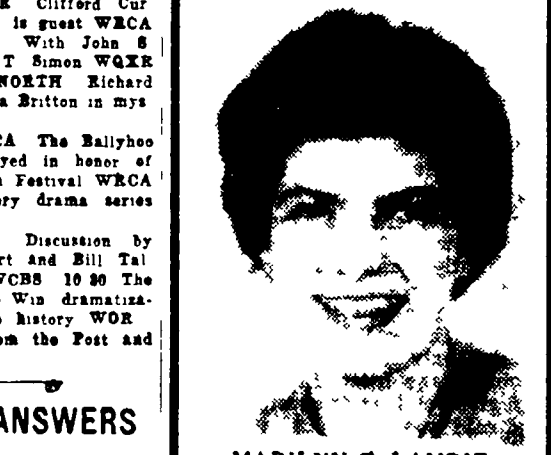

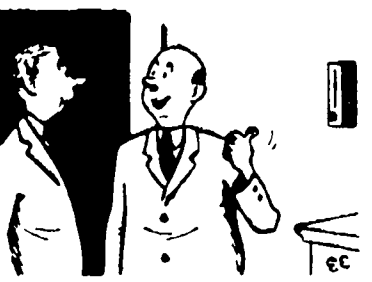

Fix It Yourself

Notes on Sweaty and Frosty Window Glass. Around this time last year (it was a little colder as we recall) a friend asked us what he could do to prevent sweating windows. We told him to get storm sashes and shutters. Day or so later he asked us what could be done about sweating windows and storm sashes and we told him to open the vents in the storm sash to allow the moist air to flow outdoors. A few days went by and this certain individual comes to us and says he has opened the vents and drilled holes where there were no vents but things are still bad. We tell him (this was our last hope) to try weatherstripping the inside sash which he does and which fails to do any good.

Now a situation like this can become, after a period of time, discouraging for all concerned so one fine cold day we drove out to his house to see what this was all about. We opened the door and for a minute we thought we were back in a jungle. The temperature in that house must have been close to eighty degrees and the humidity must have been close to ninety-nine. They had hot baths running, hot showers running, the humidifier on the furnace running, things boiling on the kitchen range and the washing machine and clothes dryer going full blast. What's more, his wife was busy watering all the indoor plants.

We carefully explained that if you have a high indoor temperature and flood the air with moisture, you are almost sure to get condensation and frost during very cold weather on certain surfaces exposed to the cold. We said if he'd turn off those showers, reduce the humidifier and use an exhaust fan to remove the moist air, we don't think he ever got around to doing it.
