PERLEA CONDUCTS JAN. 26 CONCERT

Jonel Perlea, European conductor, who is to direct Connecticut Symphony musicians and singers at the "Samson and Delilah" concert Jan. 26 in Klein Memorial Auditorium, was guest conductor with the Chicago Opera company last November.

Member of the faculty of the Manhattan School of Music where he gives a course in conducting during the winter months, Mr. Perlea, prior to coming to the United States last fall, conducted three performances of "The Marriage of Figaro" and three of "Tristan" for the Naples Opera company.

Makes Recordings Since then he has made recordings for Vox label of the Beethoven 4th, 7th and 8th symphonies, three Mozart symphonies and Tchaikovsky's "Romeo and Juliet."

The chorus will comprise 200 voices from the Bridgeport Chapter of the American Organists Guild, an organization of 17 choirs from the greater Bridgeport area. M. Louise Miller is dean.

DOGS FOR COLLEGE

CALDWELL, N. J.—(AP) Working your way through college by raising thoroughbred collies and rare Norwegian Elk hounds isn't easy. Especially when your neighbors don't like dogs. But Edith Smith, 18-year-old Montclair Teachers College student is making a go of her \$3,000 kennel. And so far she's been upheld by local authorities.

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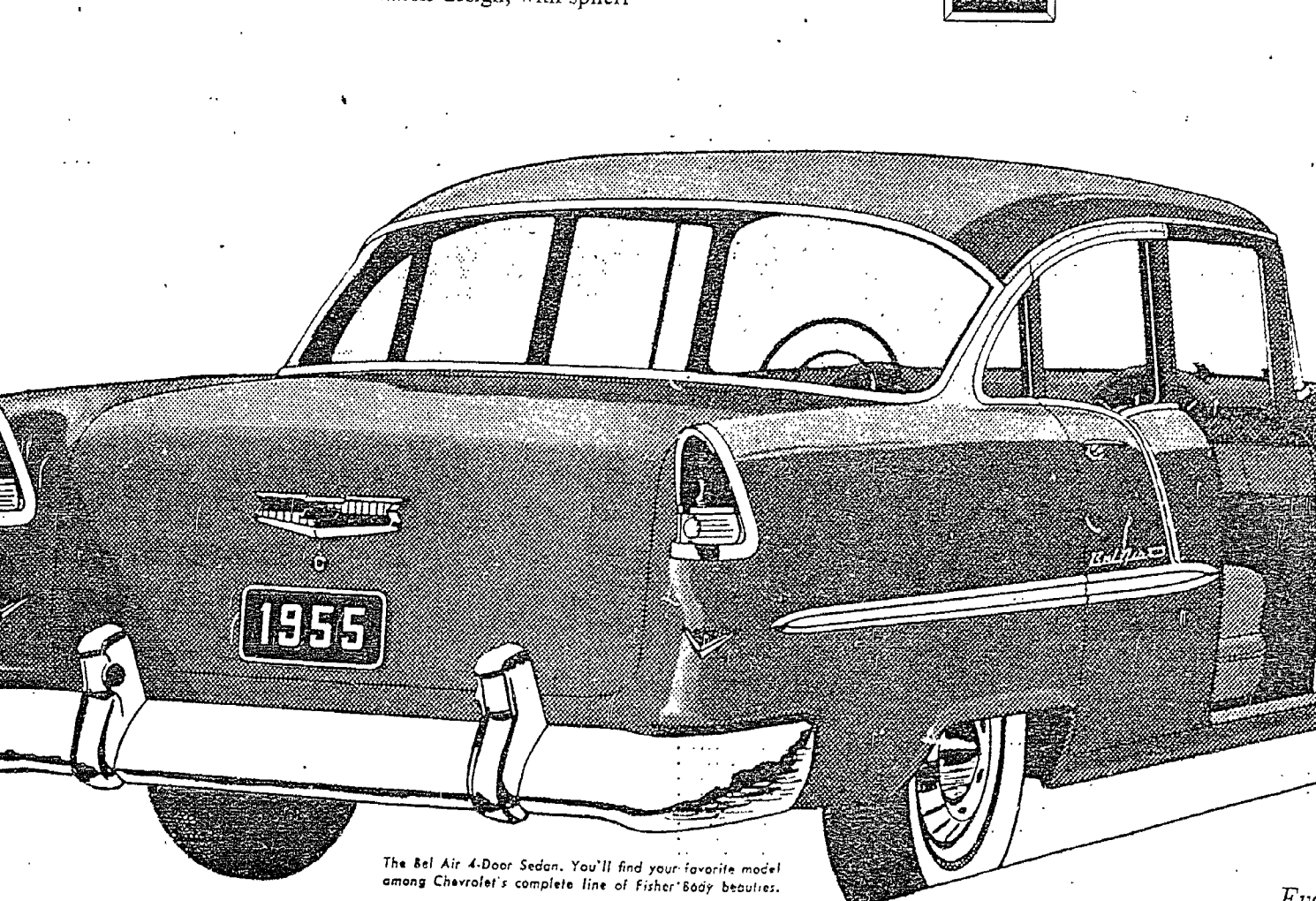
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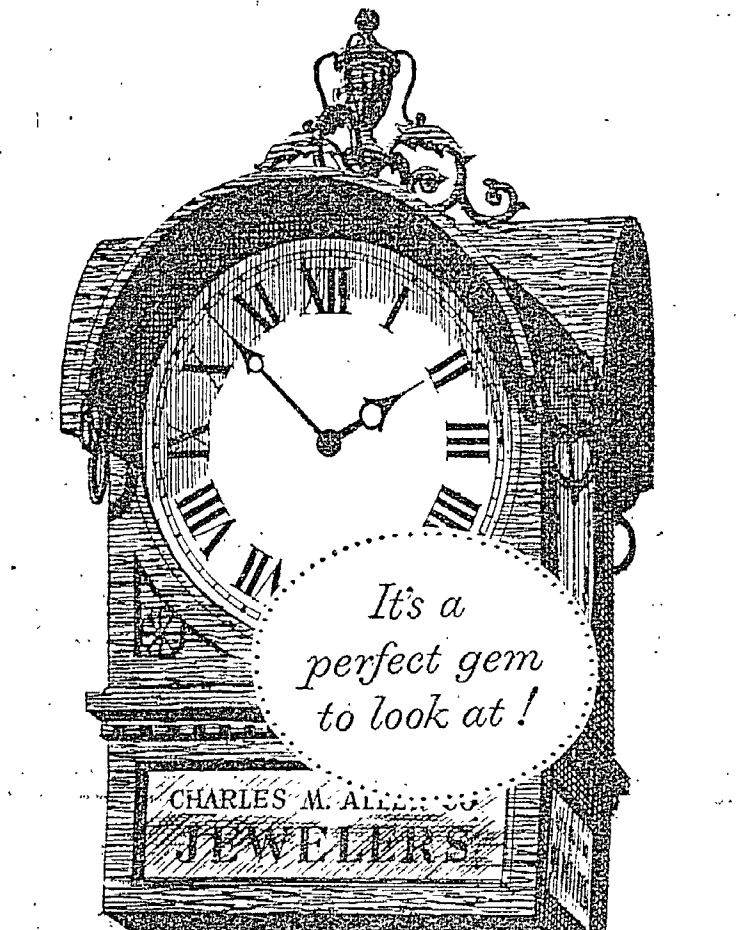
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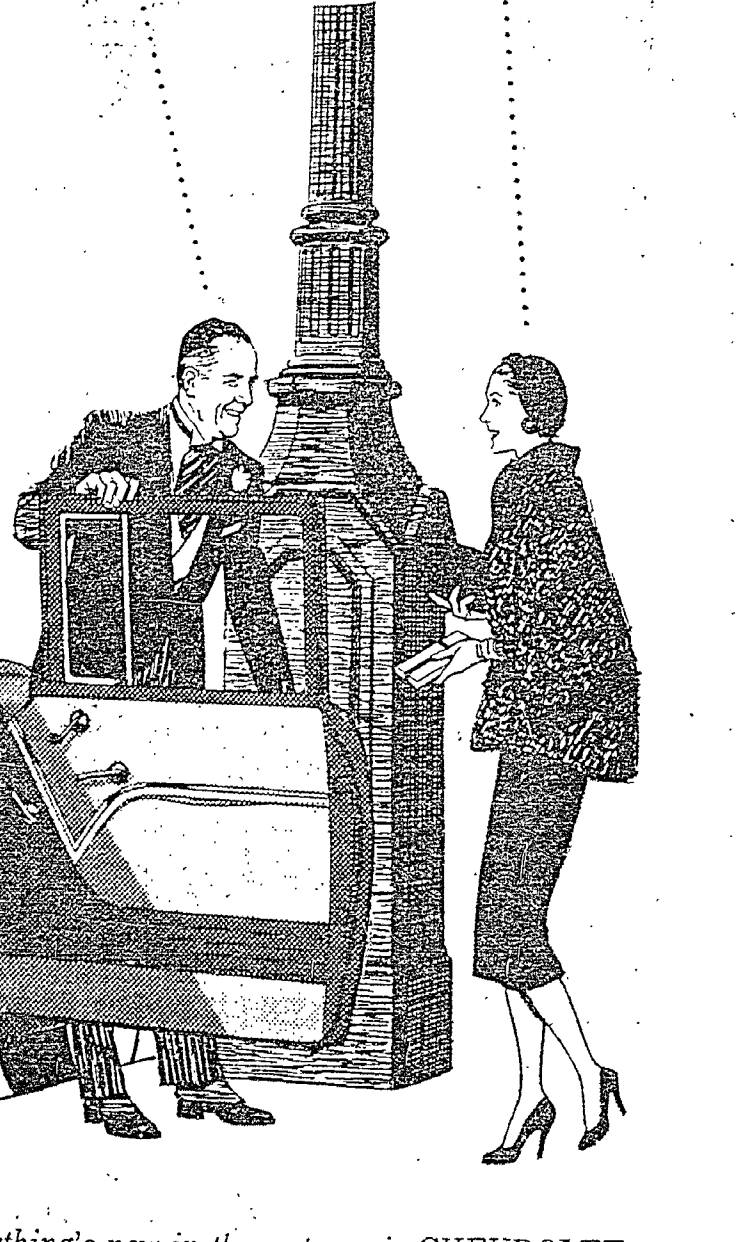
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
