

TURNING THE DIALS

Munich, Germany, will be the origination point for a discussion of the subject, "What Will Germany Do With Her New Independence?"

Both Americans and Germans attending a seminar in Munich will take part in the question period of the broadcast.

Fall Preview Fall gets a preview from Ruth Steinkraus tonight as she plays such numbers as the Autumn music from Haydn's "The Seasons" and Vivaldi's "Autumn Concerto."

On the second half of her program, "Music for a Sunday Evening," she will have as her guest Richard Grayson, the coordinator of the American Shakespeare Festival Theater and Academy in Stratford and an avid record collector.

Aspen Festival Music from the Aspen Music Festival in Colorado and a sound-illustrated survey of the activities of the Aspen Music School will be presented by James Fasset.

Hans Schweiger, regular conductor of the Kansas City Philharmonic, directing the Aspen Festival orchestra, will open the broadcast with a performance of the suite "Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme" by Richard Strauss.

The second half of the program will be devoted to a picture in sound of the classrooms, opera house, master classes, lectures and recitals in the Aspen Music School.

This musical montage includes an excerpt from a rehearsal of Act III of Gounod's "Faust"; a master class in string ensemble by the New Music Quartet; master classes by Mack Harrell, baritone; Vronsky and Babyn, duo pianists; and on Mozart's use of the flute by Albert Tzortz, flutist.

A special program titled "Championship Preview" with noted fight experts discussing the Rocky Marciano-Archie Moore title bout and giving their predictions for the outcome, will be broadcast tomorrow night from 8 to 8:15 o'clock over WABC.

The principal number will be the finale from Edvard Lalo's "Symphonie Espagnole," and shorter selections will include "Piece in the Form of a Habanera" by Ravel; "Minstrel's" by Debussy and "Wieniawski's" dazzling "Caprice in A Minor."

Game of Week WABC radio will broadcast the "Ivy League Football Game of the Week" again this season, starting next Saturday.

Plans call for a play-by-play broadcast of an outstanding Ivy League grid contest each Saturday for a total of nine games.

"Game of the Week" will be selected on the preceding Monday, the selection based on the outcome of games of the preceding Saturday.

The first play-by-play report will be broadcast "live" over WABC and WJAB.

Franciscai Plays Zino Franciscai, the French violinist, will make his first appearance of the season since his return from a European tour, on NBC radio's "The Telephone Hour" tomorrow at 9 o'clock.

"Wide Wide World," NBC's far-reaching panoramic television show, will begin the 1955-56 season with a program entitled "A Sunday in Autumn."

For the first time within the span of one program, the cameras will shoot from the varied vantage points of mid-air, underwater, the deck of a boat, a moving cable car, and, of course, from the ground.

The airborne camera will function from a U. S. Air Force plane banking over the Mississippi river at St. Louis. First viewers will see a squadron of Air Force jets whipping by below.

The other cameras will pick-up equally entertaining subjects, including Donald Campbell seeking to break his own speedboat record at Lake Mead, the precision-kicking Rockettes in the Radio City Music Hall; the State fair at Dallas, Texas, underwater swimming in Florida, whale thrashing in Nebraska and the Grand Canyon in all its majesty.

Winner Is Guest Marine Captain Richard S. McCutchen of Worthington, Ohio, who won the top prize on CBS television's "The \$64,000 Question" on Tuesday night will appear on Ed Sullivan's "Toast of the Town" tonight at 8 o'clock over Channels 2 and 8.

Sylvania Awards The Sylvania Television Awards will be presented in 1955 for the fifth consecutive year. The Awards were created to honor those who are advancing creative television techniques.

The new judges will join Dean Seymour Berkson, general manager of the International News Service; Leonard Bernstein, the conductor and composer; and Jackie Robinson of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who will serve for the first time as the 1955 Committee of Judges.
