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CHECKUP ORDERED ON CIGARETTE TAX

HARTFORD, Jan. 30.—Twenty-four hours after Connecticut cigarette smokers start making their one cent a pack contribution to state food recovery through a temporary tax increase on Wednesday, the State Tax department will make a statewide survey of retail outlets, it was announced today.

State Tax Commissioner John L. Sullivan said his department's entire force of sales tax examiners will be assigned to inspect packages of cigarettes for over-the-counter or vending machine sale in the retail establishments. The check is intended to disclose any packs which do not carry stamps or meter impressions showing that the additional levy has been paid.

Stamps which retailers must affix to all cigarette packages in their possession go on sale at 8:30 a.m. tomorrow at 17 temporary field offices of the department. An estimated 10,000,000 of these will have been bought by retailers before the sale ends at 4:50 p.m. Feb. 3. Stamps of higher and lower denominations than the one-cent variety have been made available for packages containing more or less than 20 cigarettes.

In the meantime, wholesale distributors have been imprinting meter impressions of the new rate, on all packages in their hands before distribution to retail outlets. The cigarette tax boost will remain in effect for nine months. The anticipated revenue from the tax is \$2,160,000.

Commissioner Sullivan said that all cigarette packs found by the examiners to be lacking the stamps or impressions will be inventoried and reported to the Excise division of his department. The sale of cigarettes without proper markings showing payment of the increase will subject the vendor to forfeiture of the cigarettes, loss of license and criminal prosecution.

Retailers in the Bridgeport area may purchase stamps at the Tax department's temporary offices at 1211 Fairfield avenue, Bridgeport; 148 South street, Danbury; 45 West avenue, Norwalk; 676 Main street, Stamford; and 87 Main street, Ansonia, the department announced.

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DOCTORS REVIVE INFANT FOUND FROZEN TO DEATH

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(AP) An infant found in a frozen condition on a doorstep yesterday was pronounced dead at General Hospital, but later gave out a few feeble gasps and was revived. The infant, a boy, had a temperature of 73 degrees and no detectable heartbeat when examined at the hospital after being found on a front porch in the northeast section of the city. Doctors estimated he was about five weeks old.

NEHRU BLASTS RIOTERS AT MARTYR'S DAY RALLY

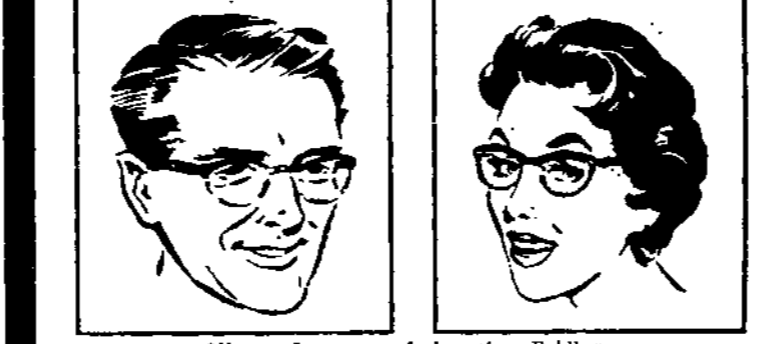
NEW DELHI, India, Jan. 30.—(AP) Prime Minister Nehru today called India's recent provincial rioters hoodlums. He said they could not force him to resign. Nehru addressed a mass meeting on Martyr's Day, honoring those who fell in the country's struggle for freedom from British rule. The day coincided with the eighth anniversary of Mohandas K. Gandhi's assassination. The Prime Minister said the demonstrators in Bombay, Orissa and Bihar states could not force the government, by terrorism and bloodshed, to reverse its decision to redraw state boundaries along language lines. Between 200 and 400 died in Bombay alone in the "language riots" earlier this month.
