

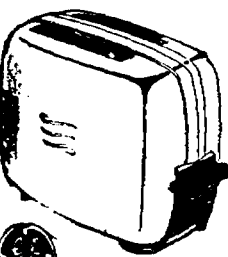
PRESLEY FILM SCENES

TURNING the DIALS

The noted French conductor Paul Paray, who was appointed music director of the Detroit Symphony orchestra in 1952, will make his first appearance as guest conductor of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony on CBS radio this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Tossy Spivakovsky, the violinist, will be soloist with the orchestra and will play Mendelssohn's "Concerto for Violin and Orchestra in E Minor." Paray will open the broadcast program with the Haydn "Symphony No. 96 in D Major" ("Miracle" symphony). This is one of the so-called London symphonies which Haydn wrote for a series of subscription concerts beginning in 1791 in London.

Debussy's music is always a high point of Paray's programs, and to close this program he will play the three symphonic sketches from Debussy's "La Mer." This work, considered to be Debussy's orchestral masterpiece, expresses the sound and feeling of the sea in the surge and break of the advance and retreat its musical rhythms.

Paray, past conductor of the Orchestre Lamoureux and the Concerts Colonne of France, made his American debut at the Lewisohn Stadium in New York in 1937. He has been guest conductor of a number of American orchestras, conductor in 1949-50 of the Israel Philharmonic.

During the concert intermission, James Fassett will present recordings from the unique collection of mechanical musical instruments in Munich's Deutsche Museum, put on tape by E. Power Biggs during a recent European jaunt.

TELECAST TOPICS

Colorful documentaries of the ways in which the academic theater contributes to the legitimate theater today will be presented on the new "John Hopkins Film 7" series this afternoon over Channel 7 at 3:30 p.m. The telecast, entitled from "Campus to Broadway" will have guests outstanding in both fields to discuss the topic. Notable scenes of campus origins of modern drama techniques will be interpolated. Major examples to be discussed and documented include:

Birth of the popular biographical drama or musical: Scenes from the musical "Yankee Doodle Boy" concerning the late George M. Cohan, as first presented in 1939 at Catholic University, Washington, D. C., by Leo Brady and Walter Kerr. There Cohan first viewed and approved his musical autobiography.

Development of the modern theater-in-the-round as first used at the University of Washington and filmed there. The university evolution of historical pageantry now very popular throughout the country—illustrated by scenes from "Lost Colony," offered each year at Manteo, N. C.

An outstanding example of actors who have graduated from college drama departments to the Broadway stage; John Astin of the cast of the current hit "Major Barbara." He was schooled at Washington and Jefferson College and Johns Hopkins University, and will enact a favorite bit from a play to be selected.

Discussion guests will be the Rev. Gilbert Harke, O. P., of the drama department at Catholic University; Dr. M. Bryllion Fagin of Johns Hopkins University drama department; and Leo Brady, formerly of Catholic University and author of the book and movie "Edge of Doom."

Astin will participate in the discussion which will be moderated by Lynn Poole, host and co-producer of the series.
