FAIRFIELD CRASH INJURES WOMAN

One person was injured in three accidents investigated by Fairfield police yesterday morning.

Kay Moffett, 26, of 82 Crescent road, Fairfield, received a back injury at 2:07 a. m. when a car operated by Verele E. Weyls, 49, of 76 Wakeman road, Fairfield, struck the rear of a car, operated by William J. Scholtz, 21, of 148 Pearl Harbor street, which was halted for a red light on Kings highway at Jennings road. She was treated by a private physician.

Mrs. Weyls was arrested by Patrolman Ambrose Smith on a charge of violation of state motor vehicle laws and summoned to Town court Jan. 7.

John White, 24, of 446 Atlantic street, Stamford, was arrested by Patrolman George Hutton on a charge of violation of state motor vehicle laws at 4 a. m. after his car was in collision with another operated by Ralph Blackburn, Jr., 33, of 189 Colonial drive, Fairfield, on the Post road, near Fairfield place. He was summoned to court Jan. 14.

Patrolman Hutton reported that Mr. White, traveling east, crossed the center line and struck the left front end of Mr. Blackburn's auto which was traveling east.

Police are seeking a hit and run autoist who struck the rear end of a parked car on Kings highway cutoff, near the Comet diner shortly after midnight. The car, operated by Mary A. Churney, 37, of 84 Country road, Fairfield, was towed from the scene, police said.

New England has been picked as the site of the world's top center for nuclear fuels.

Land has been optioned at West Andover, Mass., for the multi-million dollar installation, to be operated jointly by Sylvania Electric Products and Corning Glass Works.

The proposed center is to represent an investment of \$20 million, according to estimates. Initial construction alone will run in the neighborhood of \$5 million.

Andover won out over more than 50 other locations checked as possible sites, reports the New England Council.

In another part of Andover, the \$6 million project to switch the huge Shawheen Mills into electronics is under way, reports the New England Council.

By next September Raytheon Manufacturing will have 1200 on the payroll, it is estimated, turning out military electronics equipment on an initial \$35 million government contract.

The company's first 100-man staff unit is already at work in the former American Woolen mill, which Raytheon has leased from Textron Inc. They are overseeing the big job of preparing the mill's one million square feet of space for electronics manufacture.

Raytheon expects employment at the operation to reach 6,000 within two years if demand for military equipment continues high. At peak production in textiles, the mill employed approximately 2,500.

Plastics will add jobs in Newport, N. H.

The newly-organized Peterson Plastics Inc. is scheduled to begin operations there shortly after the first of the year, The New England Council reports.

About 30 will be employed in producing a variety of plastic items, according to William C. Peterson, who heads the company.

In Brockton, Mass., two companies turning out precision parts for jet engines are in partial production in new quarters.

Technology Engineering Co. and Process Equipment Co. are rapidly completing the shift to a plant purchased last August. In addition to jet engine parts, the combined companies manufacture chemical process equipment for the chemical, textile, paper and food industries.

More than 100 experienced workers will be on the expanded payroll as soon as full production is reached some time this month, according to a firm official.

UCONN GETS \$7,600 FROM CANCER GROUP

STORRS, Dec. 16—(AP) A University of Connecticut scientist, investigating the chemistry of phosphorus-containing proteins in collaboration with several graduate students, yesterday received a \$7,600 research grant for a year's support of the project from the National Cancer Institute.

The scientist, Dr. C. A. Kind, assistant professor of the Zoology department, was told that the institute has also agreed to maintain its support for at least two years.

Dr. Kind has centered his research around the general area of the chemistry of growth for the last five years and from 1953-55 the work has been supported by the American Cancer society, which contributed \$10,770.

Dr. Kind says the biological formation and breakdown (metabolism) of phosphorus-containing proteins is poorly understood and even their chemical structure is almost entirely unknown.

Present work is being carried out with the collaboration of Robert Kutner and L. J. Denhart, graduate students in biochemistry.
