

MYSTERY CLOAKS PERRY VANISHING

GUILFORD, Dec. 24—(AP) On Dec. 13 magazine writer George Sessions Perry dropped from sight. He hasn't been heard from since.

Where is he? "You tell me," said Police Chief Joseph Quinlan today. Quinlan headed the search of the hilly, wooded area around the Perry home here.

It was on a Thursday that Mrs. Perry went to the dentist and returned to the house to find that her 46-year-old husband was gone.

This was surprising because Perry suffered from arthritis. He lost 60 pounds last year, but still weighed 185. He stood 6-4.

Chief Quinlan said the search, which at one time was made up of 250 men a day, has dribbled off until now a few volunteers go out when the weather is good.

He said volunteers had planned to use two golden retrievers today, but a chill, soaking rain kept them in.

Police have already used bloodhounds, divers, a helicopter, an airplane and a glass-bottomed boat.

Two ponds on the Perry property have been searched, and one partially drained.

Rumors and reports that Perry, who wrote the "Cities of America" series for the Saturday Evening Post, was seen in other parts of the country have been run down without result, Quinlan said.

Quinlan made a remark he has made often lately when he was asked if any efforts were planned in the future:

"You tell me what to do and I'll do it."

To add to the mystery, Perry must have been wearing only a tweed jacket, corduroy trousers and shoes, since this was all that was missing. And police said he couldn't, with his arthritis, have made his way more than a mile or two from his home. The Perrys have no children.
