

Coronation Pageantry To Be Broadcast On WIBA

For the first time in the long history of British kingship, the actual words with which a monarch solemnly pledges to fulfill, to the best of his human ability, the most mighty temporal trust and responsibility on earth will be carried audibly beyond the seas as part of NBC's broadcast of England's coronation, on May 12. Not only the oath of the new king, but the entire ceremonial dialogue between King George VI and the Archbishop of Canterbury, will be heard through WIBA at 3 a. m., Madison time.



A classical air will be lent to the Symphony concert tonight on WIBA at 7 o'clock, when Rosario Bourdon conducts the orchestra in Tschai-kowsky's "Tarantella," Mendels-sohn's "Scherzo" and Delibes' "Czardas." Lucille Manners will sing "Beautiful Lady", "Love's Old Sweet Song," and "Habanera."

Two famous symphonies will be presented on the Chicago Symphonic Hour over WIBA tonight from 10 to 11 o'clock, by the orchestra under the direction of Roy Shield. The selections, Sibelius' First Symphony and Haydn's Surprise Symphony, will comprise the entire program.



An all-Chopin program, consisting of a Prelude, Etude, Waltz, Nocturne and Mazurka, will be played by Abram Chasins, American pianist-composer, during his Music Series Saturday - morning over WIBA at 11 o'clock.

WIBA's Club Matinee swings into its first Saturday session tomorrow, starting at 1:30, with hot music, sweet music, concert style, novel-ties, vocals, and surprise features. At 3:30 WIBA will bring you the last half of the Spelling Bee, in which 30 postoffice men will dispute claim to the title. Paul Wing will conduct the broadcast, which will originate in Philadelphia and Buffalo. Then, at 4:30 comes Kalt-enmeyer's Kindergarten, always one of the best shows of the week.
