

Bright Spots on Today's Programs

One of the programs that is building up a large radio audience is the Promenade Concert, heard at 6 p. m. today over WLS and WLW. of music featuring Rosa Ponselle, Presenting a diversified program Frank Forest and the Cincinnati Symphony orchestra under the direction of Eugene Goossens, the hour is rapidly heading to the top of Sunday's must programs. Tonight Miss Ponselle will be heard singing, Kahn's "Ave Maria," Kreisler's "The Old Refrain," Farley's "The Night Wind," and Tschalkowsky's "None But the Lonely Heart." Mr. Forest contributes "M'Appari" from Flotow's opera, "Martha," and "Lolita." The orchestra will be featured in a concert presentation of "The Chocolate Soldier" by Strauss, "Golliwog's Cake Walk," "Serenade for the Doll," Saint-Saens' "Dance Macabre" and Albeniz's "Triana."
