

# Coronation Programs Be Heard Over WIBA

The most elaborate simultaneous short-wave transmission set-up in the history of radio broadcasting will serve WIBA listeners during the six or more hours of the coronation procession and ceremony which will be brought from London starting at 3 a. m., (Madison time), Wednesday morning.

In addition to the actual coronation broadcast, numerous other programs in connection have already been presented, and others are scheduled for today and Tuesday.

Tuesday night at 9:15, WIBA will present Robert L. Reynolds, associate professor of history at the university of Wisconsin in a discussion of the coronation from its legal aspects.

## Ambassador Bingham

Tuesday afternoon, at 4:40 Ambassador Robert W. Bingham will speak for ten minutes, over WIBA from London, and will conclude his remarks just before midnight in the British metropolis. Howard Marshall, commentator, will then describe the scene in London at that moment, and the program will close with Big Ben striking the midnight hour.

Another Tuesday night feature is entitled "Coronation Dawn," and will be heard over WIBA at 8:45. Kenneth Adam, BBC commentator, will give last minute news from the coronation scene, including interviews with persons already lining the route.

## WIBA On All Night

Because the coronation broadcasts start at 3 a. m. (Madison time), Wednesday morning, WIBA will remain on the air all night Tuesday, with the exception of the half-hour from 12:30 to 1 a. m. Special programs have been arranged up to 3 a. m.

The latest available schedule of events for Wednesday, as released by the British Broadcasting Corp., is as follows, but subject to change:

3:00 a. m. Queen Mary leaves Marlborough House.

3:15 Opening commentaries.

3:30 King and Queen leave Buckingham Palace for Westminster.

4:00 Arrival at Westminster.

4:15 Coronation service at Westminster Abbey.

6:15 Service ends.

6:30 King and Queen leave Westminster abbey.

8:10 King and Queen arrive at Buckingham Palace.

8:20 Appearance of King and Queen on balcony.

1:00 p. m. King's Coronation address.

## All Details on Air

For the first time history of all the details of the coronation will be available to the public, even the actual words with which a monarch solemnly pledges to fulfill to the best of his human ability the most mighty temporal trust and responsibility on earth.

Not only the oath of the new King, Emperor and Defender of the Faith, but the entire ceremonial dialogue between King George VI and the Archbishop of Canterbury, of which it is the termination, will be heard in America, exactly as it is spoken in the Abbey.

The first speech of George VI after his coronation will be additional feature of the day's broadcasts. This will be addressed to his subjects throughout the British Empire and will be heard in all parts of the world, at 1 p. m., Madison time.
