

Farm and Home Hour comes from U. W. Campus

Two special broadcasts, both pertinent to Wisconsin, are scheduled tonight and Wednesday.

The first, tonight at 8:15, will come by short wave from Germany as a salute to the state. Typical Wisconsin songs, poetry by Wisconsin writers, and addresses by persons connected with Wisconsin have been scheduled for the program, according to publicity received from Berlin.

Madison listeners with good short-wave sets should have no difficulty in picking up the broadcast. Available stations are DJB on 15.20 megacycles; DJD on 11.77 megacycles, and DJC on 6.02 megacycles. At the present time the best reception is being reported on DJC.

The second special event will be the Farm and Home hour broadcast from the university campus Wednesday from 11:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.

The program is the last in a series arranged by NBC from the country's various land grant colleges and universities. Each has been designed to show the many ways in which the agricultural schools serve the public and to present a picture of the outstanding achievements for which each school is noted.

University students and faculty leaders, including Pres. C. A. Dykstra, will be heard in sketches and brief addresses. The University Concert band, the Music Stunde ensemble, and vocal groups will contribute the musical portions.

The program will be heard through WIBA, WHA, WLBL, and WMAQ.
