

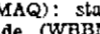

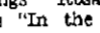
**Dramatic**

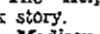

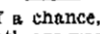

Bert Gordon, "Mad Russian" of Eddie Cantor's broadcasts, has been signed to a long term personal contract to Cantor.

Given half a chance, Lois Collier, who one month ago was a Hollywood film extra, will be one of the motion picture stars of tomorrow. That is the opinion of Frank Beckwith, who directed her first screen test at Warner bros. studio recently. Lois, featured player on the "Hollywood in Person" program, is being groomed for stardom by sponsors of the show.

George Burns and Gracie Allen have been added to the cast of "Follow The Sun," forthcoming Bing Crosby picture. In the last 19 weeks, George and Gracie have made "Damsel in Distress" at RKO, taken four weeks vacation in New York (their first in three years), finished another picture, "College Swing," at Paramount, and still found time to handle their weekly broadcasts.

A colored comic named "Pigmeat" is being looked over by network talent scouts for radio possibilities.

Lew Hearn, regularly heard on the Joe Penner show, was a vaudeville star for years before his brother, Sam, reached the footlights. But Sam has been Schlepferman for Jack Benny for four years—and now his older brother hits the radio spotlight.

Don Voorhees, maestro of the "Cavalcade of America" program, spent Christmas in the theater, waving the baton for "Between the Devil," new Broadway hit—because he agreed to stay with the show during its first week, as per custom.

All the lads who were certain the world's greatest maestro would beef plenty at the orchestra NBC gave him may be interested to know that Arturo Toscanini thinks it is "marvelous".

Norman Alley, newsreel photographer, who shot the pictures of the Panay bombing, has been offered to radio for a guest star appearance by Universal pictures which has him under contract and is asking in the neighborhood of \$20,000 for his one mike show. High figure scared away several contract extenders.

Russ Morgan, maestro on the "Johnny Presents" program has just recorded a followup version of the musical game, "Knock Knock", a ditty titled "How Many Rhymes Can You Get?"

Edward G. Robinson, star of "Big Town," has been bitten by the writing bug and is working on a radio playlet which he will release soon.
