

Meyer Davis Band Plays Favorite Music of the 400

Meyer Davis, dance maestro to the White house, the smart set of Long Island, and the debutantes of Park ave., will conduct his orchestra in a special program that will include the favorite dance tunes of America's "400" from 9:30 to 10 tonight over WENR. Barry McKinley, tenor, will assist.

Among the tunes Davis has programmed are "You Are the Reason for My Love Song," the dance hit of the Ethel duPont-Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., wedding party; "I Get a Kick Out of You," the feature number Davis conducted at the Widener party at Philadelphia last year, and several waltz favorites of Mrs. Roosevelt.
