

Music from Prom on WIBA; Black Takes Over New Job

Music from the University of Wisconsin's junior prom in the Memorial Union will be broadcast at 10 and 11:15 tonight by WIBA.

Frank Black, noted network maestro, will pick up the baton for a series of programs tonight over WIBA-WMAQ.

Lucille Manners, soprano, is star of the program. Black's vocal ensemble of 11 voices will be heard for the first time. It will be prominent in the finale medley of hit tunes by the composers, Richard Rodgers and Lorenz Hart. Miss Manners will sing "Frasquita" serenade by Franz Lehar, the "Habenera" from "Carmen" and "You and I Know." She and Tenor Robert Simmons will be heard in a duet by Jerome Kern, "They Didn't Believe Me." Simmons, supported by the choir, will sing "I Still Love to Kiss You Goodnight."
