A group of outstanding personalities of radio and stage will join in a salute to the annual Brotherhood day of the National Council of Jews and Christians in a broadcast over WBBM at 1 p. m. today. Among the artists are Lawrence Tibbett, Ande Kostelanetz, Deems Taylor, George M. Cohen, Al Shean, and Edwin C. Hill, who will preside as master-of-ceremonies. The American Federation of Musicians has volunteered to supply 50 musicians to perform under Kostelanetz's baton.
