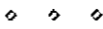

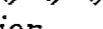

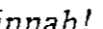

### The Winnah!

DETROIT— (U.P.) — The final ballot has been cast in the swing vs. sentiment airwaves battle and the tabulation is:

In favor of sentiment—60 per cent; in favor of swing—30 per cent; neutral—10 per cent.

Votes were cast after listeners heard songs played the way mother used to sing them and then in the version of the present swing masters during programs the past three Saturday nights. The dispute arose after Manager Leo Fitzpatrick of station WJR here ordered his engineers to cut the switch on any band which gave a modern rendition of an old ballad.

Commenting on the results, Fitzpatrick said he believed national radio chains might instruct bands not to swing such melodies as "Loch Lomond" and "Annie Laurie."

WJR announced that in votes it received in a separate poll, 90 per cent favored sentiment.
