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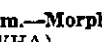
President Roosevelt will be heard frequently over the networks during his cross-country trip which will take him aboard the cruiser, *Houston*, for the maneuvers of the Pacific battle fleet and, at its end, carry him to his Hyde Park estate in New York for a brief vacation.

Two of the president's talks will be heard on anniversary celebrations. The first will be delivered Friday at Muskingum park, Marietta, O., at the dedication of the Northwest Territory Memorial and will be heard at 8:30 a. m. over WIBA and WBBM and at 8:45 a. m. over WLS.

The other anniversary talk will be the third year birthday of the social security act to which the president affixed his signature three years ago next Aug. 15. On that day, the president is scheduled to address a meeting in the Shoreham hotel, Washington, D. C., via radio from Hyde Park from 8:30 to 8:45 p. m. The Washington gathering will have Arthur J. Altmeyer, chairman of the social security board, as its president. The other speaker on the program will be Sen. Robert F. Wagner of New York.

While on his trip to the coast, Mr. Roosevelt also is tentatively scheduled to speak on Friday at Covington, Ky., at approximately 1:30 p. m.; on Saturday, at 7 p. m. in Oklahoma City, and from the grounds of the San Francisco World's fair on Treasure island, Thursday, July 14, at approximately 2 p. m.

He also is expected to be heard from Fort Worth and Amarillo, Tex.; Pueblo, Colo., and Los Angeles and San Diego, Cal. It will be at San Diego that Mr. Roosevelt will board the cruiser, *Houston*, for the fleet war games.

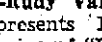

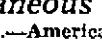

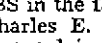
