Music

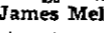
6:30 p. m. — Talliesin String Quartete (WIBA): the first of a series featuring the four members of the Indianapolis Symphony orchestra.

8:15 p. m.—Musical Moments (WIBA): "Summertime" from Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess" will be sung by James Melton.



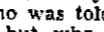

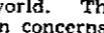


Drama
