

# U. W. Homecoming Rally Features Radio's Grid Sendoffs Tonight

Three football games will be given radio send-offs tonight—Wisconsin-Indiana, Notre Dame-Army, and Northwestern-Minnesota.

WTMJ will broadcast the Badgers' homecoming rally at 8 tonight from the lower campus of the University of Wisconsin, with talks by Coach Harry Stuhldreher, "Roundy," State Journal columnist, members of the team, campus leaders, and others.

The first Notre Dame-Army game, played 25 years ago, will be recalled in a program at 9 through WENR. Speakers will include Gus Dorais and Lt. Col. Vernon Merrillat, foes in the 1913 battle; Elmer Oliphant, another West Point alumnus; the Rev. John F. O'Hara, Notre Dame superintendent; Brig-Gen. J. L. Benedict West Point superintendent, and Coaches Elmer Layden and Bill Wood.

WBBM will air highlights of Northwestern's homecoming, including a "pep" meeting, at 10:45.

## Controversy Over O'Neill Play Ends

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — The Federal Communications commission apparently had ended its latest excursion into dramatic censorship Thursday by renewing the operating license of Station WTCN at Minneapolis, which was under fire for broadcasting Eugene O'Neill's famous play, "Beyond the Horizon."

The FCC had ordered a hearing after some listeners complained that the play was profane.

The play was broadcast by the National Broadcasting co. which was required to furnish the commission with a list of stations which carried the program, one of a series of broadcasts of "Great American Plays." As WTCN's license was up for renewal, it was the first station to be questioned on the matter.

The commission's action reversed the decision to hold hearings and apparently ended the controversy.

Several months ago the FCC protested against a nationally-broadcast skit entitled "Adam and Eve," in which Mae West of the blonde tresses and swaying hips was one of the chief participants.
