Present of Barber, Composer

The world premieres of two new compositions by Samuel Barber, a young American; Dvorak's fifth symphony, "From the New World"; Debussy's "Iberia," a tone-picture of Spain, and Paul Graener's musical salute to Frederick the Great, "The Flute of San Souci," will be conducted by Arturo Toscanini during his broadcast with the NBC Symphony orchestra, over WIBA-WMAQ at 9 tonight.

Barber was "discovered" by NBC when his works were given their first public hearing in an NBC Music guild broadcast Feb. 4, 1935. A few weeks later he was awarded the Prix De Rome and the Pulitzer prize in music. He again received the Pulitzer prize in 1936, the first composer to receive this award twice consecutively. Since then he has had three major works performed by leading American symphony orchestras. His "Adagio for Strings" and "Essay for Orchestra" will be heard for the first time during tonight's broadcast.
