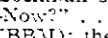


Norway's King Today on Int'l Ceremonial B

King Haakon VII of Norway will be heard throughout the United States in a special international broadcast over the NBC Red network from 1 to 1:30 p. m. today when the National Broadcasting co. broadcasts ceremonies attendant on the opening of Oslo's new short-wave station.

In addition to the addresses by King Haakon, other government leaders, including radio officials, will be heard. A program of Norwegian music will be an added part of the broadcast. The ceremonies will be carried in this area by WMAQ.
