

Religion in Dictator Countries Topic of 'Town Meeting' Tonight



Marion Schockley, who hails from Kansas City, Mo., boasts of a unique record—she claims she is the only girl in Hollywood's history who walked into a movie studio with a pass on a sight-seeing tour and came out with a signed contract. After filling parts in several films, Marion went into stock, finally landing in New York, where she played the part of "Jane Mayo" opposite George M. Cohan in "Dear Old Darling." J., one of the best known Jesuit lecturers, scholars and teachers in the United States.
