Martha Tilton, the Goodman trio and the quartet will be on hand as usual to do their part in keeping the Program "in the groove."

That haunting melody, "Melancholy Baby," will be featured by Jerry Cooper and the vocal orchestra — the Devore Sisters and the male choir, under the direction of William Stoess—on Vocal Varieties, Tuesday, over WEAF at 7:15 p. m.
