# Film Critics Present Awards to Top Stars In Broadcast Tonight

London, Paris, Hollywood, and New York will be linked by NBC tonight when the New York film critics present their annual awards for the outstanding achievements of the 1938 season.

Recipients of the awards for the best performance of an actor, the outstanding feminine characterization, the finest direction, and discussions of the best English and foreign language pictures of 1938 will be heard during the program over WENR from 6 to 6:30 p. m.

The selections are "The Citadel," best picture; James Cagney, best actor, for his work in "Angels with Dirty Faces"; Margaret Sullavan, best female performance, for her work in "Three Comrades"; Alfred Hitchcock, English director, for his direction of "The Lady Vanishes," and "Grand Illusion," best foreign language picture.

The presentation ceremonies will be broadcast from New York.

Erich Von Stroheim, star of "Grand Illusion," and Jean Renoir, its director, will be heard from Paris. From London, Robert Donat and Ralph Richardson will do a scene from "The Citadel," and Hitchcock will speak briefly.

Cagney, in New York, will do a scene from "Angels with Dirty Faces," and Margaret Sullavan, Rosalind Russell, who starred in "The Citadel," and Walt Disney will speak from the NBC Hollywood studios.

A medley of tunes from "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," which was not included among the nominations for the best picture of the year, but which received a special award, will conclude the broadcast.
