

Andrea Leeds, John Garfield To Be Teamed In Radio Play

Production To Be Given In Two Parts; Screen Guild Offering To Present Tracy And Olivia de Havilland

Andrea Leeds and John Garfield, sensational screen discoveries of 1937 and '38, have been signed to co-star in the two-part Silver Theatre production directed by Conrad Nagel, the first episode of which will be broadcast over WABC Sunday at 6 p. m. The final chapter of the drama will be presented the following Sunday, Feb. 19.

Miss Leeds, whose Silver Theatre debut with Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., in 1937 marked her initial appearance in any radio drama, is at present making a hurried return from the east to rehearse for her second Silver Theatre engagement.

A motion picture veteran and a rising star, Spencer Tracy and Olivia De Havilland, will join forces to present the second dramatic program of the Screen Guild Series over WABC Sunday, at 7:30 p. m.

Supported by a feature cast of screen actors, the two will be heard in an original play written just for the Screen Guild Show. In addition, they will have the assistance of George Murphy, master-of-ceremonies, and maestro Oscar Bradley with his orchestra. Tracy's long series of screen successes was climaxed with his winning the Motion Picture Academy Award in 1937 for his performance in "Captains Courage-

Victor Young, popular orchestra leader who used a fiddle to pry himself out of two wartime prison camps, will be heard on the Bandwagon Sunday at 7:30 p. m. over WEAf.

Young, an American by birth, got himself jammed into two concentration camps in Russia and Germany because he happened to be studying violin in Europe during the closing days of the World war. It was Young's fiddle-playing that in both cases appealed to a music-loving officers and enabled Young to negotiate his escape.

As a composer of popular songs, Young has a few equals in Tin Pan Alley. Included in the large collection of numbers he has authored are "Sweet Sue," "Can't We Talk It Over," "The Old Man of the Mountain," and "Love Me Tonight."
