

SPEEDS DEVICE CLOTHCOTTON MANU FACTURE SCHENECTADY, N. Y., Feb. 23

-(UP)—The manufacture of cotton cloth at speeds faster than the eye can follow is forecast with a new adaptation of the "electric eve " A photoelectric cell mechanism developed by General Electric en-

gineers to detect flaws in cloth manufacture is said to permit finishing speeds **as** high as 110 yards per second-100 yards faster than with manual inspection. The device is designed to locate

misaligned threads, start motors of machinery to correct the flaws, and re-test the finished product. Engineers explained that it is

necessary to realign threads which have gone askew, especially when cloth is to be printed, to prevent distortion of the design. The cell's designers believed the new device also may be adjusted to other materials to speed
