

Tim And Irene Will Appear With Betty Lou At Party

New Song By NBC Production Staff Member To Be Given Premiere; Short Notes Of Interest To Listeners

Tim and Irene, favorite comedy team of radio and vaudeville, will visit the party over WEAf, Saturday, at 8:00 p. m. Besides their comedy act they will be heard in a conversation with Tommy Riggs' little Betty Lou. Tim Ryan and Irene Noblette played leading roles in musical comedy road shows, and were starred in vaudeville, before they made their radio debut in 1931. Since then they have been featured in many network programs.

Following this broadcast, the party will come from Hollywood for the next five weeks, while Tommy makes another picture. After that it will return to Radio City. Bea Wain, swing songstress, and Larry Clinton's orchestra are regular musical features of the program.

A new song, "Church on the Hill," by Austen Croom-Johnson, a member of the NBC production staff, will be given its premiere on the air Saturday, on the Fred Waring program from 8:30 to 9:00 p. m. over WEAf. The Waring Glee Club of 55 voices will introduce "Church on the Hill," including in the rendition the old favorite "The Bells of St. Mary."

Another highlight of this show will be the entire gang's version of the spiritual "Shadrack" which has lately been adapted into a popular swing song.

Donna Dae will sing "Good for Nothin' But Love," and the Twin Trios, Three Men and Three Girls, will present a special arrangement of the Barcarolle from "Tales of Hoffman."

The program will include Poley McClintock, Waring's frog-voiced comedy drummer in cut-up antics, the swingsters Two Bees and a Honey, Patsey Garrett, Jane Wilson, Gordon Goodman, Stuart Churchill and the Waring 25-piece orchestra.

Andre Kostelanetz, "Tune-Up Time" maestro, because of the amount of newspaper space he has rated as an aviation enthusiast and air traveler, was made an honorary member of the Front Page Club this week.

Kay Kyser and his orchestra, following their two-weeks engagement at the Strand Theatre in New York, are planning a series of one-nighters while en route to Cleveland where they will play a theatre engagement of one week starting May 10.
