Cohan, who last week made her professional stage debut; Frank Rusoti, of Vicksburg, Mich., who gave up a fortune rather than return to Italy to live; Eddie Jones of Hollywood who grows angle-worms for a living; Dorothy Hoffman and Jane Butler of New York City, who decipher doodles, and Edward Niques, also of New York, who paints out black eyes, will appear on "We, The People" over WABC Tuesday at 9:00 p. m.

Miss Cohan, who represents the third generation of Cohans to work on the stage, is now featured at a leading New York night club. She will tell of trying not to follow the family tradition and why she finally succumbed to the lure of the theatre.
