

Haunted House Mystery Is Solved By Parker, Friends

Charlie McCarthy's Guest To Be Helen Hayes, Distinguished American Actress; Lovelorn Writer To Be Interviewed

Mystery of the famous "ghost house" of Jonesport that has been vacant for 20 years is solved by Seth Parker and his neighbors in their regular Sunday broadcast at 7:30 p. m. over WJZ.

Seth and his friends hold their regular Sunday "gathering" in the ghost house and discover the weird noise that has disturbed the town for years is caused by the wind blowing thru a piece of screen that has dropped into the chimney.

Grandma Hodgkins who lives with her relatives because she cannot rent or sell the haunted house, her only possession, now that the mystery is solved, rents to the newlyweds of Jonesport — Jane and John.

Helen Hayes, distinguished American actress, will make her first appearance on the Charlie McCarthy hour Sunday. She will be heard with Don Ameche in the dramatic feature of the broadcast over WEAJ at 8 p. m. Charlie McCarthy's own special guest will be Beatrice Fairfax, author of a well-known "Advice to the Lovelorn" syndicated column.

Dorothy Lamour, Donald Dickson and Robert Armbruster's orchestra are other features of the show.

Jack Benny will play "Boswell" to Don Wilson's "Johnson" when he presents a dramatic chronicle of the announcer's 16th year career in radio during the broadcast with Mary Livingstone, Kenny Baker, Phil Harris' orchestra and Rochester over WEAJ Sunday at 7 p. m.

Benny claims that he can prove not only that Wilson made his kilocycle debut as a quartet singer, but also that the corpulent announcer was the quartet. He has even unearthed facts which indicate that Wilson might still be doing his multiple warbling over the Denver station if the local musician's union hadn't stepped in and ordered Don to incorporate or pay three stand-bys.

Shirley Ross, who made her screen debut five years ago as a bit player in a picture starring Lee Tracy, will share the spotlight with him once again—this time as his co-star—during the "Silver Theatre" broadcast over WABC Sunday at 6 p. m.
