

Air Sunday; Cunningham cast Tonight

Premier Benito Mussolini's address in which he is expected to demand cession of French colonies to Italy will be broadcast early Sunday by American networks. The airing will begin at 3:45 a. m. on WIBA and at 4 a. m. on WMAQ and WBBM.

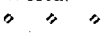
