

# Loretta Young Joins Tracy For Production Of 'A Man's Castle'

Crooks' Concert Will Be Aired From San Francisco Fair; Pearce And Gang Bid Farewell To New York City

With Spencer Tracy in the Radio Theatre's production of "A Man's Castle" Monday, will be Loretta Young in the part she originally created in the motion picture. "A Man's Castle" with Cecil B. DeMille as producer, is to be broadcast over WABC at 9:00 p. m.

Loretta Young, whose current motion picture is "Kentucky," takes the part of the bewildered Trina whose simple ambitions are to have a home and a husband. She achieves one of her ambitions by marrying Bill (Spencer Tracy) but her husband cannot provide her with the much desired home.

The Voice of Firestone concert Monday at 8:30 p. m., will come over WEF from the Golden Gate International Exposition at San Francisco. Richard Crooks, singing with a specially organized orchestra conducted by Alfred Wallenstein, will be heard from the stage of the Western States Auditorium on Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay.

Crooks, continuing his concert tour, will be heard on the Firestone program the following two weeks from Los Angeles, Wallenstein conducting a specially organized orchestra also in that city.

On his San Francisco program, Crooks will sing Kreisler's "The Old Refrain;" "The Dream," from Massenet's "Manon;" Westendorff's "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen" and Schubert's "Serenade," Orchestral numbers will include the Overture to Rossini's "Barber of Seville;" "Dance of the Tumblers," from Rimsky-Korsakow's "Snow Maiden;" and the Waltz from Tchaikowsky's "Eugen Onegin."

Al Pearce and his Gang will bid farewell to New York — for the current season, at least — during their program on WEF Monday from 8 to 8:30 p. m.
