These two actors are among the group of players Edwin Whitney, production director, plans to use frequently to interpret the highly imaginative Oboler dramas. Others in this group are Ann Shepherd, Betty Caine, and Frank Lovejoy.

Stoopnagle, just returned from Hollywood, headlines the "For Men Only" program over the NBC-Red network Tuesday, at 8:30 p. m.
