

# Red Skelton Set As Guest At Premiere Of New Program

"How To Get Out Of Dog House" Title Of Sketch To Be Presented; Moss Hart To Bare Ambition

Red Skelton, radio, vaudeville and movie comedian, will be a guest at the premiere of Uncle Walter's Dog House program over WEAF Tuesday at 9:30 p. m. He will be introduced by Tom Wallace, the Uncle Walter of the new show, which is supposed to bring consolation to unfortunate males finding themselves in the dog house of disfavor.

Musical numbers will include "I Want a Girl," "Alice Blue Gown," and "I Surrender Dear," sung by Dorothy Davis, the "Sweet Adeline" of the program. The Dog House Trio, composed of Bud and Gordon Vandover and Marlin Hurt, will interpret "That Old Gal of Mine," while Phil Davis and his orchestra will be heard in "Sweet Little Headache" and "Two Hearts in Three-Quarter Time."

Wallace will present a drama based on a letter on "How to get out of the Dog House," and announce details of a letter contest to be used as the basis of future dramas.

Moss Hart, co-author of the successful play, "The American Way," Thyra Samter Winslow, well known short story writer, and Harry Salter, orchestra leader, will confess to secret ambitions when they appear as guest artists during the If I Had the Chance program Tuesday at 9 p. m. over WJZ.

Hart is co-author with George S. Kaufman of the panorama of American life now playing at the Center theatre in Radio City. The play has been given before packed houses since it was launched recently. Taylor Holmes again will be heard as guest master of ceremonies.

Broadway's versatile George M. Cohan, playwright, actor, producer and songsmith, will line up with John Kieran, Franklin P. Adams and Oscar Levant on the Information Please board of experts Tuesday. His appearance on this program over WJZ at 7:30 p. m. recalls his latest stage appearance. It was in "I'd Rather Be Right."

Among the plays of which Cohan is author are such hits as "Get-Rich-Quick Wallingford," "45 Minutes from Broadway" and "Seven Keys to Baldpate." He played leading roles in many of his own plays. With Sam Harts, he was responsible for the production of more than 50 plays. Of Cohan's many song hits, "Over There," war-time marching song, was probably the outstanding success.

One of the few living persons who actually witnessed the first Kentucky Derby in 1875, an authority on international affairs, and a "tested-selling" salesman will reveal their inside stories on the Inside Story program, Tuesday, from 7 to 7:30 p. m., over WJZ.

Claude Graham, venerable Kentuckian, will tell how the horse-racing event started and why it was called derby. Elmer Wheeler, the man who found the "sizzle in the steak," "the sales pin in the clothes pin" and other tested-selling phrases, will tell how he discovered inside selling secrets.

Third guest on the program will be Julien Bryan, lecturer and author of the documentary film, "Inside Nazi Germany." Fred Sullivan will interview each of the guests and Glenn Welty will conduct the orchestra.

The story to be dramatized on the program recalls the boy's entry into war and his tragic return home, badly wounded and mentally diseased. His inability to rehabilitate himself leads to an unusual climax. "Because He Couldn't Kill" is the title of the story to be dramatized.
