# Bret Harte's Life In West To Be Dramatized On Radio

Old Ranger To Spin Yarns On Death Valley Days Program Over WEAF From 8:30 To 9 P. M. Friday

Bret Harte's life in the old west, where he gained the inspiration for many of his famous stories, will be told by the Old Ranger during the Death Valley Days program over WEAF from 8:30 to 9 p. in. Friday, the 37th anniversary of the author's death.

Lured to California in 1854 by prospects of mining gold, Bret Harte met the man who was to become the prototype WASH TUBBS-UNEXPECTED of "Tennessee's Partner," and the boy who later figured in "The Idyl of Red Gulch."

As a Wells Fargo messenger, Harte encountered the strange "Outcasts of Poker Flat," and as a clerk in an apothecary shop, he prescribed for the baby who was to touch the emotions of readers of "The Luck of Roaring Camp."
