

Corrigan To Be Interviewed On "For Men Only" Broadcast

Famous "Wrong Way" Pilot To Swap Conversation With George Jessel Tuesday Evening

Douglas Corrigan, famed "wrong-way" flier, back in New York after making the picture, "The Flying Irishman," will be interviewed on the For Men Only program Tuesday. The interview, conducted by George Jessel, master of ceremonies, will be broadcast over WEAJ at 7:30 p. m.

On the same program will be Cholly Knickerbocker, New York society reporter whose distinctive gossip about the doings of the "400" is familiar to readers from coast to coast, and Mae Questel, cartoon voice of "Olive Oyl" and similar characters. The Merry Macs will sing with Peter Van Steeden's orchestra.

Fourteen-year old Judy Garland, whom Sophie Tucker calls "the best swing singer of them all," makes a return appearance on the Bob Hope show Tuesday at 9 p. m. over WEAJ. The young MGM star has just returned to Hollywood after a successful personal appearance tour in the east and will tap her new repertoire of special arrangements for new songs for the broadcast. Skinnay Ennis and his band will furnish the musical background and the comedy will be divided between Patsy Kelly and Jerry Colonna.

Bella Spewack, co-author of the Broadway musical comedy hit, "Leave It to Me," and Rex Stout, author of the "Nero Wolfe" novels will join regular members of the board of experts on the Information Please program over WJZ Tuesday, from 7:30 to 8:00 p. m. Miss Spewack and Stout, the latter making his third appearance as a guest expert, will be heard with Franklin P. Adams and John Kieran in meeting the questions fired at them by Clifton P. Fadman.

Persons in disfavor with their wives and sweethearts will be given a few tips on getting back in good grace during the dramatization "How I Got Out of the Dog House," during the broadcast of Uncle Walter's Dog House, Tuesday, from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m. over WEAJ. Based on information received from a listener, the skit will be a feature of the second program in the new comedy series. Tom Wallace, as Uncle Walter, will preside over the program, assisted by the Dog House trio, Sweet Adeline, blues singer, and Phil Davis and his orchestra.

Dorothy Thompson, brilliant journalist and NBC news commentator, will broadcast a special message from New York to delegates attending the annual meeting of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in San Francisco when she speaks over WEAJ Tuesday, at 6:45 p. m.

Miss Thompson is to speak on "Adjusting Democracy for Human Welfare." This subject constitutes the general theme of the Federation's series of programs heard regularly on NBC.
