

Pat Ellis And Rathbone To Be Guests On Crosby Hour

Cinema Stars Will Swap Small Talk With Bing And Bob; Pretty U. C. L. A. Co-ed May Be Heard

With Patricia Ellis and Basil Rathbone on his guest list, and Pat Friday, pretty U. C. L. A. co-ed, scheduled to appear if she has recovered from the throat ailment that kept her away from the Music Hall last Thursday, Bing Crosby will touch on topics ranging from modern music to classical poetry during his broadcast with Bob Burns and John Scott Trotter's orchestra Thursday from 9 to 10 p. m.

Miss Ellis will chat with Burns and Crosby about Hollywood topics, and Rathbone is expected to have another of his favorite poems to introduce to the host of the hall. Crosby will sing "Delightful Delirium," "When You Were Sweet Sixteen," "If I Didn't Care," and "Don't Worry About Me."

William Gaxton and Victor Moore, the Damon and Pythias of modern musical comedy, now starring in the Broadway hit, "Leave It To Me," will dash across the street between the first and second acts of their show, to make a guest appearance on "Tune-Up Time," Thursday evening.

The famous comedy team will deliver a routine from "Leave It To Me," and sing two of the most popular hits from the show. Both will broadcast in their stage costumes. Gaxton as the smartaleck foreign correspondent will sing "From Now On;" while Moore, in the role of the timid American ambassador in Moscow, will be heard in "I Want To Go Back to Topeka," a song which has not been given on the air before.

Other highlights of the broadcast will include two real musical treats prepared by Maestro Andre Kostelanetz and his 45-piece orchestra. The first will be a Kostelanetz treatment of "Stardust," Hoagy Carmichael's classic; the second, a streamlined version of Wagner's immortal Magic Fire Music, from "Die Walkure."

A musical kaleidoscope, ranging from concert selections by Dallas Frantz, internationally famous pianist, to "Three Little Fishes," as interpreted by "Baby Snooks" (Fanny Brice) and the "Jitterbug Trio," will be the predominant feature of Good News of 1939, Thursday at 8 p. m., over WEAF. Robert Young will also present songstress Connie Boswell, regulars Frank Morgan, Bailey (Daddy) Stafford, Warren Hull, Meredith Willson's orchestra, and dramatic guest stars.

Frantz, a concert virtuoso, will lend a note of distinction to the program, joining maestro Willson and the orchestra in a "Concert Hall" arrangement of Bach's "Organ Prelude in D Major" and "March," from "The Love For Three Oranges" by Prokofieff.

By contrast, "Baby Snooks," assisted by jitterbugs Frank Morgan, Robert Young, and Meredith Willson, will sing "Three Little Fishes," more agonizingly known as "Fee Itty Fitties." Connie Boswell, popular rhythm-singer, will
