

Rosenberry, Dykstra, Colbert Speak Today on Citizenship Program

Citizenship day at Manitowoc, when 1,200 young men and women become voting citizens, will be celebrated in a special broadcast featuring addresses by noted educators, municipal and state officials, at 11:30 a. m. today over NBC, WIBA, WMAQ.

Clarence A. Dykstra, president of the University of Wisconsin, and Prof. R. J. Colbert of the university faculty, who conceived the event, will speak of the significance of Citizenship day. Interviews with Chief Justice Marvin B. Rosenberry of the state supreme court, Manitowoc townspeople, and a representative group of young persons who will become citizens also will be heard.

Martial music by the 65-piece Manitowoc marine band, conducted by Emil Scheweide, will conclude the broadcast. Announcer Durward Kirby will be at the microphone.

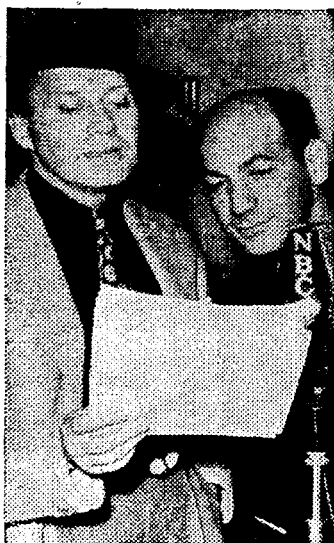
