

Bartholomew, Miss Roberts Will Be Guests Of Crosby

Pat Friday Expected To Keep Date Twice Postponed Because Of Illness; Douglas On Good News Show

Freddie Bartholomew will be one of a trio of youthful guests on Bing Crosby's Music Hall Thursday; Beverly Roberts, young film star, will chat with Crosby and Bob Burns during the broadcast over WEAJ from 9 to 10 p. m. and Pat Friday, U. C. L. A. co-ed, will keep a date that was twice postponed because of illness.

Crosby will sing "The Lady's In Love," "And the Angels Sing," "I Cried For You," "Sly Old Gentlemen," and a hit of 1923, "That Old Gang Of Mine." Miss Friday will sing "Begin the Beguine" and "Sing a Song of Sumbrellas."

Meliza Douglas and Meliza Korjus will visit Good News of 1939 when Robert Young opens the broadcast with Frank Morgan, Fanny Brice, Meredith Willson and his orchestra and the Max Terie chorus, over WEAJ Thursday, at 8:00 p. m.

Douglas will be heard in Robert Riley Crutchers' "Speaking of Murder." Meliza Korjus will sing Testi's "Serenata," and will be featured in the Concert Hall presentation, Johann Strauss' "Tales from the Vienna Woods."

Connie Boswell will sing "Wishing" and "Swing as a Bug in a Rug," and Fannie Brice and the Jitterbug Trio, Young, Morgan and Willson, will present their version of "Three Little Fishes."

Mickey Rooney's composition, "Cuban Swing," will be presented for the first time on the air by Willson's orchestra. "Concert in the Park" will be another orchestral highlight.

Concluding his stay in the film capital, Rudy Vallee will lead for New York where his variety hour broadcasts will originate beginning Thursday from 7:00 to 8:00 p. m., over WEAJ. The NBC star will leave Hollywood after celebrating his 50th broadcast for the same sponsor, on May 18. A cast of radio and stage stars will be on hand to welcome Rudy back to New York.

Tommy Dorsey and his famous dance band, which now is heard over WEAJ Wednesdays at 7:30 p. m., will swing out with four additional half-hour programs each week beginning Thursday.

The new series of summer broadcasts, which have been arranged on a sustaining basis, will be presented each Thursday and Friday at 10:30 p. m., on WJZ, each Saturday at 10:00 a. m., also on WJZ and each Monday at 11:00 p. m., on WEAJ. This will mean that Dorsey's army of fans may hear his music for a total of two and a half hours every week.

The High Product of Swing will bring all of his boys with him for the new series. As usual the vocalists are to be quiet, husky-voiced Eddythe Wright and personable Jack Leonard, Skoots Herfurt, hot tenor saxophonist and specialty singer, also will be on hand and it goes without saying that Dorsey's lazy, liquid trombone will continue to play an important part in the proceedings.

Benjamin Franklin Miessner, the electronics pioneer who is chiefly responsible for the existence of Tom Adrian Cramer's all-electronic orchestra, will be guest speaker when that unique musical organization makes its debut over WJZ, Thursday, from 9:00 to 9:30 p. m.

The electronic orchestra, a dance-band consisting of instruments which produce their tones entirely by means of electrical amplification, owes its existence largely to the work done by Miessner, musically-minded inventor who has specialized in electronic instruments. Altho many of the

instruments in the orchestra have been redesigned by Cramer and others, nearly all are founded on basic inventions developed and patented by Miessner.

Secretary of Commerce Harry L. Hopkins and two noted industrial leaders will discuss the ramified problems confronting world trade and their relation to our foreign policy, in a broadcast over WJZ Thursday, from 8:00 to 9:00 p. m.

Other speakers are Edward R. Stearns, chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corp., and Greene K. Howard, general manager of General Motors Overseas Operations who also is vice chairman of the National Trade Council. With Secretary Hopkins as the principal speaker, they will be heard as they address business and industrial leaders at the World Trade Dinner to be held in the Casino of Nations at the New York World's Fair.
