

Municipal Louis Air Tonight

The story of municipal opera in St. Louis, from its founding in 1919 to its present status as one of the world's great outdoor theaters, will be told in dramatization and music at 10 tonight over WBBM. Selections from more than 150 musical operettas and other works given since its inception will be sung by Nancy McCord, musical comedy and light opera star, as soloist, with the opera chorus and orchestra directed by George Hirst.

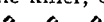
