

Famous Radio Child Actor To Be Guest Of Fred Allen

Walter Tetley, Known As "Wee Harry Lauder" To Play Part In Rollicking Farce With Town Hall Company

"Walter "Wee Harry Lauder" Tetley, famous radio child actor and for years a member of Fred Allen's microphone company, will return to the Yankee jester's Town Hall Tonight program as a guest star on Wednesday at 8 p. m. over WEAf.

A radio veteran of 10 years experience, youthful Tetley will be greeted as the returning prodigal after a two-year sojourn in Hollywood. He will give his famous imitation of Sir Harry Lauder and join his former comrades, The Mighty Allen Art Players, in a rollicking sketch entitled "It's a Bra Bright Moonlight Night O'er Hollywood."

Walter was born in New York City, altho his mother was native of Glasgow, Scotland. From his grandfather the youngster picked up a rich Highland dialect, and from phonograph records a repertory of Scotchsongs. Walter made his radio debut on Madge Tucker's Children Hour on NBC in 1930 and almost overnight became the leading juvenile performer on the air. For several years he was one of the standbys of Allen's Town Hall troupe, until he departed for Hollywood two years ago.
