

"Liebestraum" Will Be Sung By Lucille Manners Friday

Schipa's Transcription To Be Used; WEAF To Carry Gotham's Welcome To King And Queen

Tito Schipa's vocal transcription of "Liebestraum" will be sung by Lucille Manners, soprano, as a highlight of her program Friday from 7 to 8 p. m. over WEAF. Miss Manners also will sing Harrison's "In the Gloomings" and Stolz's "Goodbye Little Captain of My Heart." Ross Graham, baritone, will be heard in Koeneman's "When the King Went Forth to War," and with Miss Manners, in Tate's "Somewhere a Voice is Calling."

Dr. Frank Black will conduct the orchestra in the Waltz Intermezzo from Delibes' "Naila," Dance of the Clowns from Rimsky-Korsakoff's "The Snow Maiden," Entrance and Procession from Goldmark's "The Queen of Sheba," and Merry-makers Dance from German's "Nell Gwynn" suite. Siczynski's "Vienna Dreams" and a medley of waltz melodies from Victor Herbert operettas, by the ensemble, will round out the broadcast.

Arrival of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth at Pier One in the North river Saturday, where they will be welcomed by Gov. Lehman, Mayor LaGuardia and other dignitaries, will be described over WEAF from 10 to 10:30 a. m. Following their arrival, the King and Queen will motor to the New York World's Fair where their reception by Grover Whelan will be broadcast over WEAF from 11 to 11:30 p. m.

A glittering array of British stage and screen stars, engaged in theatrical ventures in New York and Hollywood, will pay homage to their Sovereigns King George and Queen Elizabeth in a full hour radio production over National Broadcasting Co. networks Sunday, as the Royal Couple relax from the rigors to their North American tour.

The surprise radio tribute, not listed in the Royal program, was conceived by Gertrude Lawrence. It will be presented from 2 to 3 p. m. over the coast-to-coast NBC-red network, as their majesties rest at Hyde Park, N. Y., as the guests of President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

With Miss Lawrence as mistress of ceremonies, presiding from the NBC Radio City studios in New York, the broadcast will present a host of British-born theatrical stars and the NBC symphony orchestra in 60 minutes of music, drama and comedy.

Among those who will take part in the tribute are Leslie Howard, Freddie Bartholomew, Herbert Marshall, Laurence Olivier, Dennis King, Judith Anderson, C. Aubrey Smith, Sir Cedric Hardwicke, Roland Young, Anna Neagle, Cecilia Loftus, Basil Rathbone, Brian Aherne, Edna Best, David Niven, Norma Shearer and Madeleine Carroll. 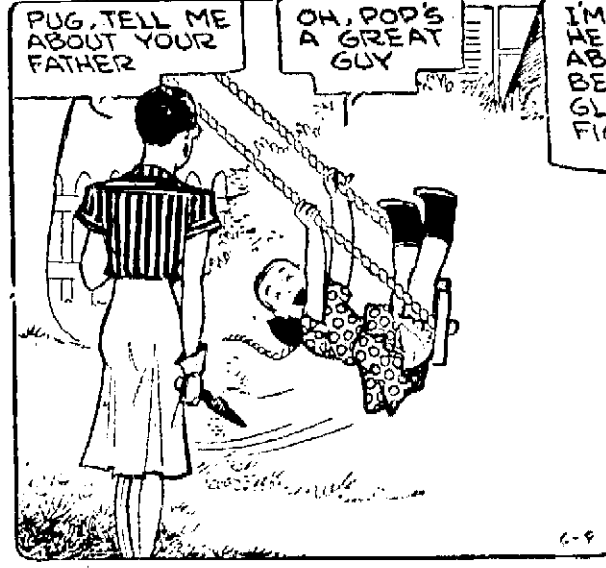

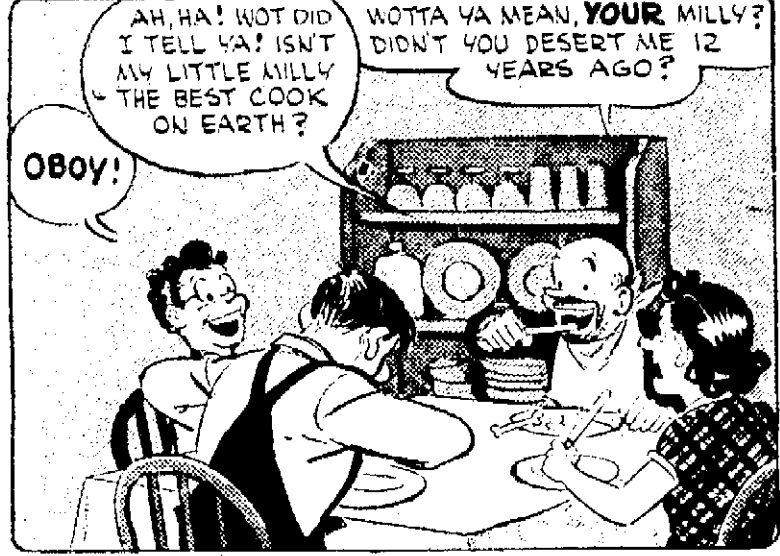
