

Miss Young, Alec Templeton To Visit Charlie M'Carthy

Lovely Star To Appear In Sketch With Ameche: Famous Pianist Will Be Making First Of Two Guest Appearances

Loretta Young and Alec Templeton will pay a visit to the Charlie McCarthy hour, Sunday, from 7 to 8 p. m. over WEAF. Miss Young will renew her acquaintance with Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, and Templeton will be making the first of two successive guest appearances on the program.

Templeton will offer several piano solos and will engage in banter with Bergen and McCarthy and Dorothy Lamour. Miss Young will appear opposite Don Ameche in a dramatic sketch. Songs by Donald Dickson and Dorothy Lamour, accompanied by Robert Armbruster's orchestra will round out the broadcast.

Marc Connelly, author of many great stage plays, will join the ranks of The Circle during the broadcast from Hollywood Sunday from 9 to 10 p. m. over WEAF.

Connelly will be initiated into The Circle by Lawrence Tibbett, Madeleine Carroll, Groucho and Chico Marx and Robert Emmett Dolan.

Tibbett's musical contributions to the informal broadcast will be Cole Porter's "Begin the Beguine," "On the Road to Mandalay" and "Edward." Dolan's orchestra and the Foursome will round out the musical portion of the program.

Two broadcasts of the Hollywood Playhouse, Sunday and June 18, will be devoted to production of "Conquest" starring Charles Boyer who also played the leading role in the picture version of the play. Doris Nolan will be heard in the leading feminine role, that of Marie Walewska, the Polish beauty who captivated Napoleon. The two Sunday broadcasts of the play will be heard over WJZ at 8 p. m.
