Carlton Brickert has returned to the cast of "Betty and Bob." Formerly in the role of Bob's father, this time he's playing Defense Atty. Wainwright.

Bebe Daniels and Ben Lyon, once the reigning pair of the silent screen and now the sensation of London radio, are concluding a brief visit to New York and the World's fair. They're heard regularly over BBC and much of their material is written here by Mort Lewis, writer and master of ceremonies of "If I Had the Chance."

Approximately 26 major stations will carry the "Big Town" transcriptions during the summer, with Edward G. Robinson in the leading role, starting July 6. The majority will broadcast the series for 26 weeks.

"Tune-up Time," which features Dr. Andre Kostelanetz' orchestra, and Walter O'Keefe, takes a six-week vacation starting July 3 but returns to the CBS network at the same time, Mondays at 6 p. m., Aug. 21. In the meantime, Kostelanetz will fulfill a heavy schedule of concert dates, winding up at the Hollywood bowl Aug. 8.
