

Lyn Murray, Ralph Edwards Get Spots With Phil Baker

Pair Replace Harry Salter And Harry Von Zell;
George Jessel To Have Celebrities
Wednesday

Lyn Murray and Ralph Edwards will replace musical director. Harry Salter and announcer Harry von Zell respectively when Phil Baker's "Honolulu Bound" program shifts from Saturdays to Wednesdays over ABC. The new Wednesday series will be aired at 7:00 p. m.

The replacements were necessitated by other Wednesday night radio commitments on the part of Salter and von Zell which conflicted with Baker's new air time. With the exception of these two, the rest of the cast holds intact and will continue to feature Bottle, Beetle, the Andrews Sisters and Johnnie Pineapple and his Islanders.

Murray has long been one of Columbia's most valued batoneers and director of vocal groups. His versatility as an entertainer, writer and musician has brought him programs of his own in which he has worked both as actor and singer. Of London birth, Lyn came to America in 1925, working first as a newspaper man before turning to music for a career.

Participants in the first Wednesday night broadcast of George Jessel's Celebrity Program, to be heard over WEAF from 8:30 to 9:00 p. m., will travel to Radio City from Broadway, Hollywood and the New York World's Fair. The guests to be interviewed by the comedian-master of ceremonies are George S. Kaufman, noted playwright and wit; Andy Devine, gravel-voiced screen comic and radio stooge of Jack Benny; Maxine Sullivan, Negro singing sensation, and Jimmy Lynch, daredevil auto stunt driver at the Fair.

The Celebrity Program, formerly heard on WEAF Tuesdays at 8:30 p. m., now occupies the last half of the hour in which Fred Allen, vacationing, broadcast his Town Hall Tonight program thru June 28. On the first Wednesday program will be introduced a brand new vocal combination of three boys and a girl called The Star Dusters and featuring petite May McKim. Peter Van Steeden and his orchestra continue with the program in the new Wednesday series.

"What's My Name?" popular new quiz program starring Fred Uttal and Arlene Francis, will start a summer run in place of Fred Allen's "Town Hall Tonight" Wednesday at 8:00 p. m., over WEAF.

Tried out successfully during the winter on a small hookup, "What's My Name?" proved sensationally popular as a different kind of audience participation program. In it the members of the studio audience compete for cash prizes in attempting to identify well-known personalities by means of biographical clues.

For example, if the clues were "My first job was in the Boston Public Library, then I turned to juggling in vaudeville, and now I'm an air-comedian who delights in the role of 'One Long Pan,'" the winning answer would be Fred Allen.

dress in which he will discuss the question, "Shall We Send Our Youth to War?" He will speak from 8 to 8:30 p. m.

Hoover's talk is in the nature of a reply to a question put to him by Sumner Blossom, editor of American Magazine, and is based on an article by Hoover to appear in the August issue of that publication. He will be introduced to listeners by Blossom, who regards the former President's statement "as of unusual interest and importance to all Americans at this time of international confusion."

One Man's Family, popular NBC dramatic serial depicting the adventures of the Barbour family, will return to San Francisco, the scene of its microphone debut, beginning with the broadcast Wednesday, from 7 to 7:30 p. m., over WEAF. Written by Carlton E. Morse, One Man's Family went on the air in San Francisco, in April, 1932, and was heard from that city until 1937, when it moved to the film capital.

Kay Kyser and his troupe of entertainers, concluding their two week's engagement in San Francisco, will travel to Hollywood where their College of Musical Knowledge program will originate Wednesday from 9 to 10 p. m. over WEAF. The following day Kyser's band will begin a week's engagement at the Paramount theatre, Los Angeles. During the broadcast from the NBC Hollywood studios, Kyser will quiz members of the studio audience on their knowledge of contemporary music and musicians. Virginia Simms, Harry Babbitt and Sully Mason, vocalists, will be heard with the orchestra in musical portions.
