Interstate Crime Control Discussion Tonight's Headliner

A roundtable discussion by authorities on crime laws who are attending the conference of the interstate commission on crime control in San Francisco this week will be presented over WIBA and WMAQ at 9:30 tonight. Taking part in the discussion will be Judge Richard Hartshorne, president of the interstate commission on crime; Gov. Culbert L. Olson of California; Gov. Herbert R. O'Connor of Maryland, and San Francisco Police Chief William J. Quinn.

Discussed over the roundtable will be the obstacles which interstate laws place in the way of crime control and measures which the commission hopes will overcome some of these. What the commission terms "legal underbrush" along the boundary lines of the state which prevent capture of criminals who cross a state line will be a topic, as will be one of the measures the commission has fathered to counteract this, the "fresh pursuit act," already enacted by many states permitting an officer to follow a criminal into another state and arrest him there.
