

# Pearce And Gang Will Mark 'Hawaiian Night' On Monday

## Great Deal Of Confusion Certain As Zanies Do Stuff; Rep. Jones, Of Lima, To Talk On Neutrality

"Hawaiian Night," with a deal of confusion as to just how it should be done, will be celebrated by Al Pearce and his Gang on their WEAF program Monday at 7:00 p. m. Elmer Blurt, in beachboy guise — a Bing Crosby model shirt — will undertake, for instance, to sell bagpipes instead of ukuleles to the island natives. On the other hand, Eb and Zeb will strain their salesmanship in an effort to dispose of a large stock of grass skirts to their customers in Corn Center.

Arlene Harris and Kitty O'Neil will go native in hula skirts and leis, with appropriate chatter, while tenor Everett West and the King Sisters, singing with Carl Hoff's orchestra, will provide a fitting musical background for the South Seas extravaganza.

Rep. Robert F. Jones, of Lima, will speak on neutrality over WJZ from 9:45 to 10 p. m. Monday.

Altho Jones' talk will be made from Washington, the key outlet for the Blue Network is WJZ, New York City.

Stuart Robertson, English bass, and Glenn Miller and his orchestra, who have shot to national stardom in little more than a year, will headline the Magic Key of RCA program Monday at 7:30 p. m. over WJZ.

The full-hour broadcast also will feature Nathaniel Shilkret and the Victor Concert Orchestra, Colonel Lemuel Q. Stoppnagle, the "news-in-rhyme" Rodgers Sisters and LeRoy Miller, popular Philadelphia entertainer, who will introduce Glenn Miller's music.

Robertson, brother of Anna Neagle, well-known British film star, is currently making a brief visit in this country. A sensational success with the British Broadcasting Corporation, which grants him more time each week than any other artist, Robertson also has appeared in motion pictures, among them being "Victoria the Great" and "Queen of Destiny," which soon will be released in this country by RKO, and has made numerous best-selling recordings for Victor. He made his first radio appearance in the United States over NBC networks Sunday, July 2.

Margaret Speaks, soprano soloist of the Voice of Firestone program, will be heard in "When You're Away" from Victor Herbert's operetta, "The Only Girl," during the broadcast with Alfred Wallenstein's orchestra Monday from 7:30 to 8:00 p. m., over WEAF. Miss Speaks also will sing Schertzinger's "Marcheta," La-Forge's "Come Unto These Yellow Sands," and Spencer's "Underneath the Stars." Wallenstein will conduct the symphony orchestra in the Ballet Music from Delibes's "Coppelia," "Molly On the Shore" by Grainger, and the Tschalkowsky waltz, "Swan Lake."

Southern moonlight and the lure of the Pacific hold the spotlight during the Carnation Contented program Monday at 9:00 p. m., over WEAF when music of the South Sea Islands are presented by Leo Kempin and his orchestra and vocalists.
