

# Favorite Melodies Will Be Broadcast Friday Evening

Frank Munn To Feature Hit Tune From "Yokel Boy;" Old Ranger Set To Spin Unusual Yarn

"I Can't Afford to Dream," from the new musical show, "Yokel Boy," will be Frank Munn's featured tenor solo during the Waltz Time program, with Abe Lyman and his orchestra and the Waltz Time chorus on Friday from 8 to 8:30 p. m. over WEAF.

Munn also will be heard in the current waltz hit, "Stairway to the Stars." Orchestral selections will include Herbert's "A Kiss in the Dark," "Love's Fancies," "Dealer of Dreams," and "When Our Hearts Go Waltzing Along."

"Bring Your Roses to Her Now," and "When the Harvest Moon is Shining," will be featured by the chorus and orchestra to round out the broadcast.

The story of Lotta Crabtree, sensational actress and singer of the past century who became the idol of the public but sacrificed all private life, will be told by the Old Rainger during the Death Valley Days program Friday from 8:30 to 9:00 p. m. over WEAF. Making her first public appearance in Rabbit Creek, Calif., in 1854, at the age of six, Lotta scored such a success that her family decided to capitalize on her talents. For the next ten years, Lotta sang ballads and danced jigs in log cabins, country stores, canvas tents, and mining camps, and later became famous in the East for her roles in "Little Nell" and "The Marchioness."

fall of the Bastille and the birth of liberty in France will be commemorated by the National Broadcasting Company Friday, when it presents an historical dramatization entitled "Vive la France" over WEAF from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m.

Dr. Robert Valen, director of the French Information Center in New York City and lecturer on international economics at Columbia University, will act as commentator on the program and weave the various incidents into a whole. The script for the broadcast has been written by Welbourn Kelley, of the NBC script division. Music will be supplied by a large orchestra under the direction of Josef Honig.

The Barcarolle from Offenbach's "Tales of Hoffman" will be sung by Lucille Manns, soprano, and Ross Graham, baritone, as a highlight of the Cities Service concert, conducted by Dr. Frank Black Friday from 7:00 to 8:00 p. m., over WEAF. Miss Manns' solos will be "A Brown Bird Is Singing" by Wood, "One Day When We Were Young" from Strauss' "The Great Waltz," and Porters' "In the Still of the Night." Graham will be heard in Stothart's "The Rogue Song" and the ensemble will offer Kern's "Who," Weertsma's "Penny Serenade" and Sibelius' "Finlandia." Dr. Black will conduct the orchestra in Godowsky's "Alt Wien," Gardel's "Tomoy Ohligo," the Triumphal March from Verdi's "Aida," and "Dance of the Archers" from Borodin's "Prince Igor." The "Romance of Oil" dramatization will deal with another episode in the history of the petroleum industry.

The history of America, from Valley Forge to the present day, will be traced in song by Frank Luther, Zora Layman and their choral group in a new series of twice weekly programs to be heard over WEAF at 6:15 p. m. on Mondays and Fridays, beginning Friday.

The singers have hundreds, if not thousands, of almost forgotten folk songs to draw from for, since the earliest Colonial times, Americans have been quick to translate striking historical incidents and unusually dramatic occurrences into melody. A few examples are such one-time favorites as "The Bright Mohawk Valley," "The Capture of Burgoyne" and "Perry's Victory."
