

Unusual Presentations To Be Heard On Elman's Hour

Hypnotism Will Be Attempted Over Air; Kyser Moving Into Spot Where He And Band Got First Chance

Robert Clark, who collects slave-ship log books; John S. Greenwalt, a musician who uses leaves for instruments; Helen Fine, a student of the origin of fashions, and Howard Klein, who will attempt hypnotism over the air, are listed to headline Dave Elman's "Hobby Lobby" parade before the WJZ microphone, Wednesday at 7:30 p. m.

Clark, a resident of Providence, R. I., will read excerpts from his rare collection of logs left from the days of "black-bird" slave ships which engaged in the African trade.

The aerial hypnotism will be attempted by Klein, a printer from Philadelphia, who is president of the American Society for Psychological Research. He will endeavor to exert supernatural powers over a subject selected at random from the studio audience.

Miss Fine, of New York City, will reveal the origin of many of our present day styles. For example, she will report that high heels were made fashionable by Louis XV of France, who was sensitive about being short.

Greenwalt, also a New Yorker, will imitate various musical instruments by blowing on ordinary leaves.

Kay Kyser, the "professor" of the College of Musical Knowledge, may speak in jest, but if he makes a promise he keeps it.

He's going to prove it next week, when he and his orchestra move into the Bal Tabarin in San Francisco, the spot which gave him his first big-time chance. Kyser told Tom Gerun and Frank Martinelli, the club owners, that he and his boys would come back when they had reached the top — and they're making good with a week's stand, starting July 21.

Kyser, out on the coast making a series of personal appearances, will present his Wednesday College of Musical Knowledge from the grounds of the Golden Gate International Exposition on July 19 and 26, over WEAJ at 9:00 p. m.

Zeke Bonura, first baseman of the New York Giants, whose hitting has caused him to be one of the most discussed ball players in the major leagues this season, will be interviewed on George Jessel's Celebrity Program over WEAJ Wednesday, at 8:30 p. m. Also to be heard are Patsy Kelly, film comedienne and Frank "Bring 'Em Back Alive" Buck.

Mark Hawley, a youthful microphone veteran, will take over Harry von Zell's announcing duties on the What's My Name program Wednesday when Fred Allen's sidekick follows him into vacationland. Hawley will assume his duties Wednesday at 8:00 p. m. over WEAJ and will stay on the job until von Zell returns Aug. 16.

Hawley once was the youngest staff announcer in New York City. He entered radio in 1927 when only 17, and has been active ever since. He has supplemented his radio work by doubling as a news-reel commentator, and for five years was on the editorial staff of Pathe. By hobby he is a farmer also—he recently put in 70,000 trees on his farm in Huntington County, N. J., and is very proud of it.

Ted Sherdeman, whose original dramatic presentation, "The Cannon Will Not Fire," was awarded first prize in a previous Idea Mart series on the Pacific Coast, will be the next playwright represented on the current Idea Mart series when his "surprise" drama is presented over WJZ Wednesday, from 8:30 to 9:00 p. m. Sherdeman, whose play will be placed in competition with dramas by other members of the NBC Hollywood director's staff, will be given free reign to choose and develop the subject matter and presentation.
