As a salute to the late great George Gershwin, Erno Rapee will repeat a medley of the works of that composer to open the Musical Playhouse program with Jane Froman and Jan Peerce over WABC Sunday at 6:30 p. m.

All the musical world has been paying tribute to the memory of

the famous composer, and Rapee is repeating the medley at the request of his many friends. Jane Froman, radio's loveliest songstress who was the featured singer on the Gershwin Memorial program recently, also will be heard in the medley.

A newly composed theme song by the gifted modern composer, Raymond Scott, will be featured by Tom Adrian Cracraft's All-Electronic orchestra in its return appearance over WJZ Sunday, from 4:15 to 4:45 p. m.

Scott's latest contribution to contemporary music literature originated last week at a rehearsal of Cracraft's high-voltage dance band. Scott was fascinated by the instruments which, tho bowed, pounded, blown and fingered in the usual manner, produce their tones by electrical amplification. He improvised briefly on the Novachord, hit the 12-note chromatic tympanum several licks, and in two minutes by Cracraft's watch he had fashioned the opening bars of a new song.

Famous Swing Band To Play Job At Point

"The king of the hide-beaters, the 'idol of the alligators,' the best drummer in the world, none other than Gene Krupa himself, is coming to Sandy Beach Park at Russells Point Friday, Aug. 4.

Krupa will be remembered as the drummer who was such a sensation with Benny Goodman, and who left Benny to start his own band. Riding high on the wave of popularity, his performance in "Some Like It Hot," entrenched him more firmly than ever in the hearts of swing music lovers. When he drums, he goes "out of this world," jitterbugese for a performance that is the ultimate in swing.

Known as the "king of the hide-beaters," he has been selected on many all-American swing orchestras by famous musicians—including Paul Whiteman,
