

# Thrilling Stories Set For Order Of Adventurers Hour

## War Correspondent To Tell Of Escaping Firing Squad In Spain; Lowell Thomas Back From Vacation

A thrilling true story of the recent war in Spain will be told by Arthur Shields, well known correspondent, as a feature of The Order of Adventurers program over the Blue Network Monday at 7:00 p. m.

Shields remained in the battle zone during the last days of the fighting when most other foreign journalists had departed. Just before the final collapse of the Loyalist forces he was captured with a number of Spanish newspapermen. All of his companions were executed but, by a clever ruse, Shields managed to escape across the French border.

The second adventurer to be initiated will be Mrs. Ida C. Fletcher, of Richfield, Idaho, who clung to the wreckage of a bridge over the Magic dam near Sun Valley until she was rescued by workmen. Mrs. Fletcher applied for membership by mail on the basis of her hair-raising experience.

Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, world-famous archeologist and member of the executive board of the O. of A., also plans to tell a story this week. It will deal with his exploration of the Temple of the Living Buddha in Asia, a temple so sacred that no white man is permitted to enter it under pain of death.

Commander Felix Riesenber and Col. Theodore Roosevelt also are to be presented but Admiral Richard E. Byrd will be absent on business connected with his forthcoming trip to the Antarctic.

Lowell Thomas will return from vacation to resume his duties on the executive board.

A Syracuse, N. Y., retailer of radios will enter a new sphere of the industry when Melville Clark, a harpist by avocation, makes his radio debut during the Magic Key program Monday at 7:30 p. m.

Clark, in New York to attend the annual Music Merchants-assen convention, will be accompanied by his wife, who plays the novachord. The broadcast will be attended by many of the music merchants.

The full-hour broadcast also will present Helen Jepson, Metropolitan Opera soprano; the Victor Concert orchestra, conducted by Nathaniel Shilkret; the "news in rhyme" Rodgers Sisters, and Colonel Lemuel Q. Stoopnagle, crackpot inventor of the airwaves.

Schipa's vocal transcription of the "Liebestraum" by Liszt will be sung by Margaret Speaks, soprano soloist, as a highlight of the broadcast on Monday from 7:30 to 8 p. m. Other solos by Miss Speaks will be Kern's "I'm the Echo," Martin's "All For You," and "Romany Life" from Herbert's "The Fortune Teller." The symphony orchestra, conducted by Alfred Wallenstein, will play Wagner's "Rienzi" overture, the Farandole from Bizet's "L'Arlesienne" suite, and the waltz from Tchaikowsky's "Eugen Onegin."
